

Members of the conference, these are they whom we purpose, God willing this day to ordain elders; for after due examination we find not contrary, but that they are lawfully called to this function and ministry, and they are persons meet for the same. But if there are any of you who knows any impediment or crime in any of them, for which they ought not be received into this holy ministry, let them come forth in the name of God and show what the crime or impediment is.

Let deacons be married only once and let them manage their children and households well; for those who serve well as deacons gain a good standing for themselves and great boldness in the faith that is in Christ Jesus.

The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own, and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd."

Then shall all candidates for elder's ordination stand at their seats.

The candidates should have nothing in their hands and looking directly at the Bishop.

Bishop: Do you trust that you are inwardly moved by the Holy Spirit to take upon you the office of the ministry in the Church of Christ, to serve God for the promotion of His glory, and the edifying of His people?

All Candidates (In unison): I trust so.

Bishop: Do you unfeignedly believe all the canonical scriptures of the Old and New Testaments?

All Candidates (In unison): I do believe them.

Bishop: Will you diligently read and expound the same unto the people whom you shall be appointed to serve?

All Candidates (In unison): I will.

Bishop: It appertains to the office of a Deacon to assist the Elder in Divine Service. And especially when he or she administers the Holy Communion, to help him or her in the distribution thereof and to read and expound the Holy Scriptures; to instruct the youths, and in the absence of the Elder, to baptize. And furthermore, it is his or her office to search for the sick, poor, and impotent, that they may be visited and relieved. Will you do this gladly and willingly?

All Candidates (In unison): I will do so by the help of God.

Bishop: Will you frame and fashion your own lives and the lives of your families according to the doctrine of Christ and to make both yourselves and them, as much as in you lies, wholesome examples of the flock of Christ?

All Candidates (In unison): I will endeavor to do so, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Will you reverently obey them to whom the charge and government over you is committed, following with a glad mind and will their godly admonition?

All Candidates (In unison): I will endeavor to do so, the Lord being my helper.

(Then shall the bishop, laying his hand upon every one of them severally, say:)

Bishop: Take thou authority to execute the office of a deacon in the Church of God in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

When approached by the Bishop, each candidate, instructed by the Bishop, open their Holy Bible and place both hands on the Bible kissing it: The Bishop saying...

Take thou authority to read the Scriptures, and to preach the same in the Church of God in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

The Call of the Elders

The Ordination of Elders

Then shall all candidates for elder's ordination stand at their seats.

The candidates should have nothing in their hands and looking directly at the Bishop.

Bishop: You have heard, as well in your private examination as in the exhortation which was just made to you, and in the writings of the apostles, of what dignity and of how great importance this office is, to which you are now called. And how again we exhort you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ that you have in remembrance into how high a dignity and to how weighty an office you are called; that is to say to be messengers, watchers, and stewards of the Lord; to teach and to admonish, to feed and provide for the Lord's family; to seek for Christ's sheep that are dispersed abroad, and for his children who are in the midst of this evil world, that they may be saved through Christ forever.

Have always, therefore, printed in your remembrance how great treasure is committed to your charge. For they are the sheep of Christ, which he bought with his death, and for whom he shed his blood. The church and congregation, whom you must serve, are his Spouse, and his Body. And if it should happen the same church or any member thereof, do take any hurt or hindrance by reason of your negligence, you know the greatness of the fault, and also the horrible punishment that will ensue. Wherefore consider within yourselves the end of the ministry towards the children of God, towards the Spouse and Body of Christ, and see that you never cease your labor, your care, and diligence until you have done all that lies in you, according to your bounden duty, to bring all such as are or shall be committed to your charge unto that agreement in the faith, and to that ripeness and perfectness of age in Christ, that there may be no place left among you, either for error in religion or for viciousness in life.

Bishop: Forasmuch then as your office is both of so great excellence, and of so great difficulty, you see with how great awe and study you ought to apply yourselves, as neither you yourselves offend, nor be occasion that others offend. Howbeit ye cannot have a mind and will thereunto of yourselves for that will and ability are given of God alone; therefore you ought, and have need, to pray earnestly for His Holy Spirit. And seeing that you cannot by any other means compass the doing of so weighty a work pertaining to the salvation of people, with doctrine and exhortation taken out of the Holy Scriptures, and with a life agreeable to the same, consider how studious you ought to be in reading and learning the Scriptures and in framing the manners both of yourselves and of them that specially pertain to you, according to the rules of the same Scriptures; and for this selfsame cause how you ought to forsake and set aside as much as you may all worldly care and studies.

We have good hope that you have all weighed and pondered these things with yourselves long before this time; and that you have clearly determined by God's grace to give yourselves to this office whereby it has pleased God to call you, so that as much as lies within you, you will apply yourselves wholly to this one thing and draw all your cares and studies this way, and that you will continually pray to God the Father by the mediation of our only Savior Jesus Christ, of the heavenly assistance of the Holy Spirit; that by daily reading and weighing of the Scripture you may wax riper and stronger in your ministry, and that you may so endeavor yourselves, from time to time, to sanctify the lives of you and yours, and to fashion them after the rule and doctrine of Christ that you may be wholesome and goodly examples and patterns for the people to follow.

Bishop: And now that this present congregation of Christ here assembled may also understand your minds and wills in these things, and that this your promise may the more move you to do your duties, you shall answer plainly to these things which we, in the name of God and his Church, shall demand of you touching the same.

Bishop: Do you think in your heart that you are truly called, according to the will of our Lord Jesus Christ, to the order of elder?

Candidates: I do so believe.

Bishop: Are you persuaded that the Holy Scriptures contain sufficiently all doctrines required of necessity for eternal salvation through faith in Jesus Christ? Are you determined out of the said Scriptures to instruct the people committed to your charge, and to teach nothing, as required of necessity to salvation, but that which you shall be persuaded may be conducted and proved by Scriptures?

Candidates: I am so persuaded and have so determined by God's grace.

Bishop: Will you then give faithful diligence always so to minister the doctrine and sacraments and discipline of Christ as the Lord hath commanded?

Candidates: I will do so, by the help of the Lord.

Bishop: Will you be ready with faithful diligence always to banish and drive away all erroneous and strange doctrine contrary to God's Word, and to use both public and private monitions and exhortations as well to the sick as to the whole within your charge as need shall require and occasion shall be given?

Candidates: I will, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Will you be diligent in prayer and in reading of the Holy Scriptures, and in such studies as help to the knowledge of the same, laying aside the study of the world and the flesh?

Candidates: I will endeavor so to do, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Will you be diligent to frame and fashion yourselves and your families according to the doctrine of Christ and to make both yourselves and them, as much as in you lies, wholesome examples and patterns to the flock of Christ?

Candidates: I shall apply myself thereto, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Will you maintain and set forth, as much as lies in you, sweetness, peace and love among all Christian people, and especially among them that are or shall be committed to your charge?

Candidates: I will do so, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Will you reverently obey your chief ministers to whom is committed the charge and government over you, following with a glad mind and will their godly admonitions, submitting yourselves to their godly judgments?

Candidates: I will do so, the Lord being my helper.

Bishop: Almighty God, who has given you this will to do all these things, grant also to you strength and power to perform the same, that He may accomplish His work which He has begun, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

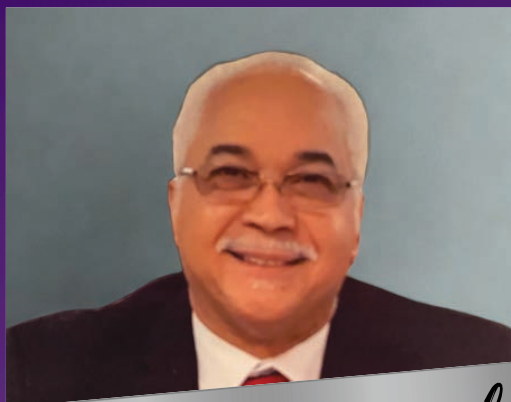

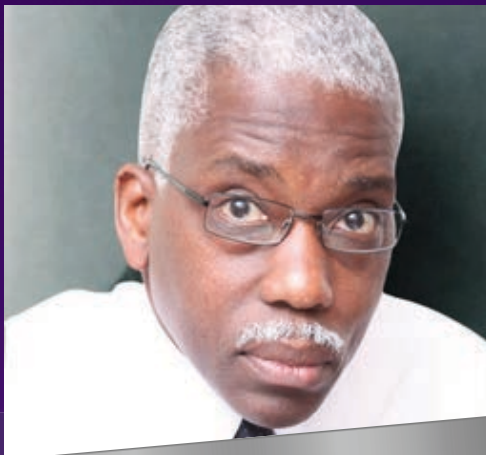

The Reverend Denise Lynn Smith-Ranel is an Itinerant Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church and currently serves as Pastor of Mount Bethel–Mitchell Chapel AME Church in Lenoir, North Carolina. She is a seasoned pastor, prophetic preacher, hospice chaplain, and singer whose ministry is marked by theological depth, pastoral compassion, and an unwavering commitment to healing, justice, and hope.

Her leadership has been evident from her earliest days in ministry. She served as President of the Rochester Institute of Technology Gospel Ensemble and Gospel Chaplain, cultivating worship and spiritual life among students. She later served as President of the Black Student Caucus at Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School, the alma mater of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., standing firmly in the tradition of prophetic Black faith and scholarship. She also served as Coordinator for Women in Ministry in the First Episcopal District, championing the voices and callings of women in the AME Church.

Rev. Smith-Ranel holds a Master of Divinity with a counseling focus, a Master of Business Administration in Entrepreneurship, and a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration. A proud veteran of the United States Air Force, she brings discipline, resilience, and clarity of call to every assignment.

Her preaching is both prophetic and pastoral, deeply rooted in Scripture while courageously attentive to the social realities of our time. She believes the gospel compels us not only to shout about hope, but to stand for justice... not only to gather in worship, but to serve with purpose.

She is the author of the forthcoming book **Rain, Rein, Reign**. She is married to the Reverend Darrell W. Ranel Sr., esteemed AME pastor and host of the legendary Darrell Ranel Morning Gospel Show, often affectionately known as “the hardest working man in radio.” Together, they are the proud parents of ten children, reflecting a life grounded in faith, family, and legacy.

She comes not only as a preacher, but as a woman called, commissioned, and sent by God for such a time as this.



Rev. Myraette McGibboney

Pastor, White Cross AME Church, Efland, NC

Rev. Myraette “Cookie” McGibboney is a devoted servant of God who loves the Lord, people, and especially children. Known for her powerful spirit, loving heart, and deep connection to community, she is a native of Greensboro and Charlotte, North Carolina. She considers the greatest moment of her life to be accepting Jesus Christ as her Lord and Savior. She is the proud daughter of the late Ruby Morehead McGibboney and Louis McGibboney and the loving mother of three children: Camille, Quinton, and Aubrianna.

Rev. McGibboney joined her family church, Persimmon Grove African Methodist Episcopal Church in Greensboro, North Carolina, at an early age. She later answered the call to ministry and faithfully served in pastoral leadership for more than two decades.

Her first pastoral appointment was assigned by Bishop Vinton R. Anderson at Elizabeth AME Church in Liberty, North Carolina (2000–2001). Under the leadership of Bishop Adam Jefferson Richardson, she served as pastor of St. James AME Church in Sanford, North Carolina (2001–2015). In 2015, she was appointed by Bishop William P. DeVeaux to serve White Cross AME Church in Efland, North Carolina, where she continues to lead faithfully. She was nominated by Bishop James L. Davis to serve a term on the Board of Examiners and was later reappointed to White Cross AME Church under the episcopal leadership of Bishop Reginald T. Jackson.

In addition to her pastoral ministry, Rev. McGibboney is a retired Registered Nurse with a heart for global missions. She has participated in medical mission trips to Haiti, Peru, the Caribbean Islands, and four Central American countries: El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. Most recently, she traveled to Rwanda, Congo, and Goma, Africa, visiting the 17th Episcopal District and the Weaver School. Her spirit of service extends to volunteering with Youth for Christ, the American Red Cross, the Salvation Army, and the American Heart Association.

Rev. McGibboney’s professional nursing career was marked by excellence and distinction. She served as a Congregational Nurse through initiatives supported by The Duke Endowment and Cone Health, ministering at Genesis Baptist Church and Persimmon Grove AME Church. She has assisted numerous churches in establishing Congregational Nurse programs and has served as a nurse for the Western North Carolina Annual Conference. Her recognitions include being named one of the “Great 100 Nurses of Excellence,” Nurse Star of the Month in RN Magazine, and author of Pregnancy-Induced Hypertension in Advance for Nurses Magazine. She received multiple honors from Cone Health, including Employee of the Month, numerous peer recognition awards, and a DAISY Award nomination. During the COVID-19 pandemic, she was recognized as a FOX8 News Hero for her dual service as both Nurse and Pastor.

Rev. McGibboney holds multiple degrees and has pursued extensive studies in both nursing and theology. She is a proud graduate of North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University (Aggie Pride), where she earned Bachelor of Science degrees in Clothing and Textiles Merchandising and Nursing. She also holds a Master of Theology from Jacksonville Theological Seminary. Her additional studies include continuing education in Congregational Nursing at Duke University and Occupational Health and Safety at North Carolina A&T State University.



Rev. Dr. Clay L. Barrow

Pastor Bethel AME Church, Greensboro, NC

A native of Philadelphia, PA, Rev. Dr. Clay L. Barrow was reared in Windsor, NC. Upon matriculating through the public school system and graduating with honors and as an NC Scholar from Bertie High School in 1989, Dr. Barrow continued his educational pursuit at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he received a BA degree with a double major in Psychology and Political Science in 1993. He attended the Candler School of Theology at Emory University, graduating in 1996 with a Master of Divinity with concentrations in Black Church Studies and Pastoral Care and Counseling. He is a 2017 graduate of Hood Theological Seminary after completing his Doctor of Ministry project, "Implementing a Pragmatic Model for Teaching Pastoral Care and Crisis Management to Candidates in the Western North Carolina Conference Board of Examiners of the AME Church." Dr. Barrow was the first to complete the D.Min. Specialization in Pastoral Theology and Care, the first to complete the program in a record five semesters, and the first to complete the program with a 4.0 GPA.

Dr. Barrow's career began in the educational field, teaching Old and New Testament at the prestigious Westminster Schools in Atlanta, GA. His ministerial career also began in Atlanta as a Volunteer Chaplain in the Atlanta Police Chaplaincy Corps. While there, Dr. Barrow initiated the first supervised ministry internship between the Atlanta Police Department and the Candler School of Theology. His employment continued at the Atlanta Urban Ministry as a tutor for children residing in two battered women's and children's shelters and later served as the Emergency Aid Coordinator. He also served as the Co-Director of the Greater Piney Grove Baptist Church/Cool Girls, Inc. Joint After-School Program, which provided academic assistance to at-risk females at a local public housing community.

Upon relocating to Sumter, SC, in 2001, Dr. Barrow completed an Internship and a one-year Residency in Clinical Pastoral Education (5 units total). After completing CPE, Dr. Barrow began working for the Santee-Wateree Mental Health Center as a school-based therapist, Triage Specialist, Crisis Team member, and After-Hours Team Coordinator.

Since graduating from Hood, Dr. Barrow serves as an Affiliate Professor of Pastoral Theology at Hood Theological Seminary, as well as the Director of Supervised Ministry, the Director of the Center for Chaplaincy, and the Area Convener (Departmental Chair) of Pastoral Theology.

Dr. Barrow is an Itinerant Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal (AME) Church, having served the pastorates of Mt. Zion in Greeleyville, SC, Mt. Sinai in Lynchburg, SC, Bethel/Red Bluff in Wytheville, VA, Clapp's Chapel in Whitsett, NC, and, currently, is the proud pastor of Bethel in Greensboro, NC. He serves the 2nd Episcopal District of the AME Church as the Dean of the Board of Examiners, Chair of the Legislative Task Force of the Western North Carolina Conference, and the Historiographer of the 2nd Episcopal District.

Dr. Barrow is married to Tawana Walker Barrow, MD (retired psychiatrist). They have two daughters: Maia, who is a recent graduate of the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, GA, and Evita Staples (Dr. Quinton Staples) of Greensboro, NC, and one granddaughter, Judah Staples. He is a proud member of Omega Psi Phi, Inc., Tau Omega Chapter, where he serves as the Chaplain.

Administrative Assistant to the Bishop/Supervisor

Director, Youth and Young Adults Ministries, Second Episcopal District

Minister Cameron I. Seawright is a dynamic leader, minister, and entrepreneur with a deep passion for service, empowerment, and spiritual development. Over the years, he has consistently demonstrated strong leadership and a steadfast commitment to activism, ministry, and community impact.

Cameron has launched two business ventures. Isaiah's Cart, a grocery delivery service, operated from July 2020 through May 2021. He is currently the owner of Isaiah's Orbit, a 360 photo booth rental company founded in June 2022.

He is a 2025 graduate of Benedict College, where he earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, graduating cum laude. While at Benedict, Cameron served as President of BASIC (Brothers and Sisters in Christ), Co-Chair of the Student Advisory Board for the Tyrone Adams Burroughs School of Business, and President of the Collegiate 100 Chapter of 100 Black Men of America, Inc. His academic excellence and leadership earned him the Spouses Education Scholarship from the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation and the Foot Locker Scholarship from the United Negro College Fund (UNCF).

He also represented Benedict College as a Congress of National Black Churches (CNBC) Leadership Scholar in Orlando, Florida, and was recognized on the Dean's List for six consecutive semesters.

From January 2023 to May 2025, Cameron served as Campus Minister at Benedict College, becoming the first student to hold this position. Affectionately known as "Pastor Cam," he led the Religious Services Department through a season of revitalization, significantly increasing worship attendance and giving, while providing tangible support to students through transportation assistance, gift cards, and emergency financial relief. Under his leadership, a proposal was submitted to renovate the historic Antidel Chapel, including upgraded audiovisual equipment, new carpeting, and refurbishments honoring the chapel's historic significance.

Cameron is enrolled at Emory University's Candler School of Theology in Atlanta, Georgia, where he has completed his first year pursuing a Master of Divinity with the support of a full-ride scholarship.

From June to December 2025, Cameron served in the 13th Episcopal District as Consultant for Youth and Young Adult Development Ministries. During this time, he authored a grant proposal, coordinated Youth and Young Adult services across all Annual Conferences and district meetings, championed the importance of ensuring this generation is seen and valued within the church, created intentional space for diverse expressions of worship, and coordinated a youth-centered international experience in South Africa aimed at expanding worldviews, cultivating cultural competency, and inspiring a global understanding of ministry and service.

Cameron currently serves as Administrative Assistant and Director of Youth and Young Adults for the 2nd Episcopal District. Rev. Dr. Patti Thompson-Frazier

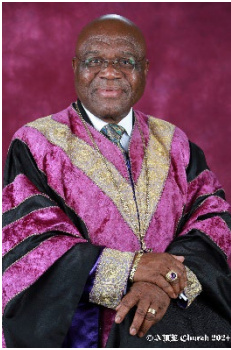
Pastor, Johnson Chapel AME Church, Mebane, NC

Bishop David Rwhynica Daniels, Jr.

Ecumenical Officer, 124th Elected & Consecrated Bishop of the AME Church

The Right Reverend David Rwhynica Daniels, Jr. of Liberia was the Pastor of Eliza Turner African Methodist Episcopal Church, in Monrovia, Liberia. Bishop John Richard Bryant appointed him pastor of Eliza Turner Memorial AME Church in February 1989. In May 1989, Rev. Daniels founded the Christian United for Peace, “CUP” which he helped to organize along with many professionals and permanent Liberians. He and many peace-loving Liberians opposed the civil war and called for a national “Peace March,” which brought out thousands of peace-loving citizens to denounce the war.

Bishop Daniels grew Eliza Turner from 12 members to over 500 in one year. The success of this ministry was swift but short-lived because of the civil war, which broke out in Liberia in December 1989.

Before his election in July 2004, he was the pastor of Turner Memorial AME in West Columbia, South Carolina. Bishop. Daniels, the visionary leader that he is, met Turner Memorial in debt, and he organized the church and instituted a Sacrificial Giving effort, which got the church out of debt in 16 months. He moved quickly to establish a school called Turner Child Development Center. They now have a thriving school with several full-time employees. Bishop Daniels was born in Rivercess County, Republic of Liberia, and West Africa in the spring of 1957. He is married to Mrs. Irene Moifoi Daniels. They are the proud parents of daughters: Danica Rwysayma, Davida Renee, and Lesha Mardea.

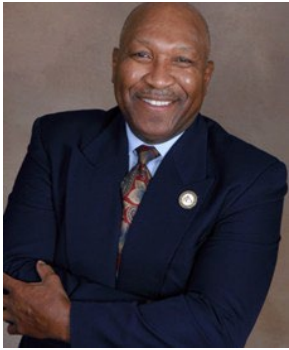
Bishop Daniels lived in the United States for a year and three months after he escaped for his life in June of 1990 from Liberia. When asked by Bishop John Richard Bryant the second time to come back to Liberia, Rev. Daniels gladly accepted the challenge. Bishop Daniels came back home to Liberia the second time to continue the ministry he began at Eliza Turner Memorial AME Church. Turner grew from a few hundred members to several thousand. The church went from one full-time employee to several employees before the 1996 hostilities.

In 1992, Rev. Daniels organized a ministry school, which developed into a seminary. It was named in honor of Bishop John Richard and Rev. Dr. Cecelia W Bryant. It was formally named the Bryant School of Ministry, “BSOM”. It is known as the Bryant Theological Seminary. Under the leadership of Bishop C. Garnett Henning, Sr., Bishop Daniels played an integral role in organizing the AME University in Monrovia, Liberia. He also the founder of Frank M. Reid, Jr. Christian School in Liberia, emphasizing spiritual and academic excellence and Christian moral standards.

Bishop David R. Daniels, Jr. holds a Master of Divinity degree from Lutheran Theological Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina. He is trained in Clinical Pastoral Counseling and holds an Advanced Pastoral Clinical Education certificate. He was awarded a Bachelor of Science degree, Magna cum Laude, in Business Administration from Allen University.

On July 5, 2004, God answered the long-awaited prayer of Bishop David R. Daniels, Jr. to go back to be used by God “To Make a Positive Difference” when he got elected and consecrated as the 124th Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in Indianapolis, Indiana. His election was a history-making event in the life of the church as the First West African to be elected from West Africa as Bishop in the AME Church. To God Be the Glory!

He was assigned to the 14th Episcopal District serving from 2004 to 2012. At the 2012 General Conference in Nashville, Tennessee, he was assigned to the 15th District encompassing Western South Africa, Namibia, and Angola, and reassigned in 2016 at the 50th Session of the General Conference in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. At the 2021 General Conference, he was assigned to the 17th Episcopal District encompassing Central Africa, including the countries of Burundi, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Rwanda, and Zambia. At the 2024 General Conference was assigned to the Ecumenical Office of the AME Church.



Dr. Vergel Lattimore

President and Professor of Pastoral Psychology and Counseling, Hood Theological Seminary, Salisbury, North Carolina

Dr. Vergel L. Lattimore III is a native of Charlotte, NC, and received his primary and secondary education in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools. He received the B.A. (with high honors) in Social Welfare from Livingstone College (1975), Salisbury, NC, and the M. Div. from Duke University Divinity School (1977), Durham, NC. He holds a Ph.D. in Pastoral Psychology and Counseling from Northwestern University (1984), Evanston, IL. He was married to Joy R.
